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

Although we have always celebrated the awesome feast of Corpus Christis (Body and Blood of Christ) in the Mass, The Liturgy of the Hours and a period of Adoration, this year our chaplain suggested a procession.

The glorious day itself celebrated this great feast, we repeated and repeated the hymn, "Christ Jesus Ruler, Christ Jesus victor," as we processed around our beautiful grounds. Thanks to the modern inventions of wheelchair, scooter and golf cart, each of our Sisters was able to participate. I think a new tradition has been born!

Catholic Heart Work Camp.com

What generous hearts the 275 young people and accompanying adults had to pay \$400 and bring sleeping bags to Bishop Bosco Center, Irwin, PA, a site they selected out of 55 cities, to provide various services to individuals and agencies. We welcomed them for the third time to St.

In just four days, our fourteen volunteers housecleaned the 54 rooms in the retreat house: washed widows inside (more than 230!) scrubbed the floors, moved furniture, waxed the floors and moved furniture back!

They also cleaned after the Flea Market: carried many boxes, moved furniture, mopped floors in the large rooms, removed and washed covers from the radiator, and thoroughly cleaned all the equipment in the retreat kitchen – including the inside of the ovens and refrigerators. When these major jobs were finished, they weeded the flower gardens and beautified our cemetery!

These wonderful volunteers from two parishes in Michigan participated fully in our Noonday Prayer. They also absorbed the information about our community and about *lectio divina* (prayerful reading – especially of the Scriptures) May God bless them.

Many people said they had never attended a Flea Market like ours! The items were clean – and beautifully displayed as if in a store. The volunteers also welcomed


the guests them so warmly, the Sisters were present, the food delicious – and the fleas were great.

IRA Tax Free Giving Available Again This Year

- The IRA owner must be at least 70 1/2 years-old
- Charitable gifts must be completed by December 31, 2009
- Gifts must be made in an outright manner gifts to fund gift annuities or charitable remainder trusts do not qualify
- A maximum of \$100,000 per donor may be given
- The distribution must be made directly from the trustee of the IRA to the charitable recipient
- A gift from your IRA counts toward your minimum annual distribution requirement
